








Labour Market Factors

- Young highly educated workforce
- The youngest workforce in the EU
- Emigration
- English language
- National wage agreements
- Minimum wage: €12.70 per hour
- Remarkable & rapid recovery in the Irish labour market from the shock of the COVID-19 pandemic
- Working from Home In 2019, Ireland had fewer than 20% of our employees working from home by 2023 it has reached 36.2%





Science & Engineering

Strong employment growth. Continued strong demand for scientists and engineers.

Skills shortages:

analytical, process, and medical scientists engineers (quality control/assurance, process, design, mechanical, electrical, automation) maintenance/lab technicians

Construction

Demand for construction-related skills is expected to grow.

Skills shortages: civil engineers & construction project managers, quantity surveyors, plumbers, carpenters

Healthcare

Demand across all healthcare occupations remains strong.

Skills shortages: medical practitioners, nurses


- Quality & Qualifications Ireland (www.qqi.ie) is the Irish centre for the recognition of international qualifications.

Know Before You Go!

- CV format may differ depending on the country
- Bring relevant documents, evidence of your qualifications.
- Practice your English language skills
- Bring your European Health Insurance Card: www.ehic.ie



Know Before You Go! (cont.)

- Qualification recognition www.enic-naric.net
- E-Forms: U1 (proof of your social insurance contributions paid in your country) or U2 (transfer your unemployment benefit to another EU/EEA country) www.gov.ie
- Bring sufficient funds
- Apply for TMS relocation support





European Targeted Mobility Scheme

- European job mobility programme which offers financial assistance to EU citizens aged 18+ in relocating for work to another EU country, Norway or Iceland (for at least 6 months contracts)
- You must apply for the financial support before you leave your country of residence and before the starting date of the new job





TMS Allowances:

1. Interview trip allowance

From €110 to €385 for travel depending on the distance travelled plus a daily subsistence allowance of €55 per day (Max 5 days)

2. Relocation allowance

A flat rate reimbursement allowance of between €770 and €1540 depending on the cost of living in the destination country. For example for someone moving to Ireland it is €1232

3. Recognition of Qualifications

A flat rate of €440

4. Language Training allowance

Reimbursement of actual costs up to a maximum of €2200

5. Family Relocation Allowance

Additional relocation support (€1232) for each of the qualifying family members traveling with the Relocation applicant.





Employer Supports

SME Employer Integration supports:

- ■There are 2 types of Integration allowances available to SME's with up to 250 employees
- ■Basic Integration programme: This can be job related training and/or language course
- ■Comprehensive If the Basic programme is combined with other placement supports such as administrative support and settlement assistance
- This Allowance is paid as a flat rate of €1,300 (Basic) and €1,620 (Comprehensive) for Ireland.

On Arrival What You Need To Do

- An EU national will need a <u>Personal Public Services (PPS) number</u> to register for employment services with Intreo/ Social Welfare office or if you are starting employment in Ireland
- Register for Tax Tax free allowance Cert.

- Open a Bank Account you will need
 - Introduction Letter from employer with exact details as per Passport
 - Driving Licence or Passport
 - Details of Irish Address Utility Bill





Renting a House or Apartment

- Landlords usually require:
- 1 month's rent in advance
- Generally require 1 year's lease
- Rental agreements are legal
- It's common in Ireland to share accommodation, check 'sharing' option on www.daft.ie





Average Rents in Ireland per month

	Dublin	Cork
1 bedroom apartment (€)	1,600+	1,200+
2 bedroom apartment	1,900 +	1,600+

Share accommodation option (a room): 700+ 500+

Cheaper accommodation can be found in smaller towns or commuter towns.

• Three course meal (mid range) €25.00 – €50.00





Are you a Non-EU national?

In order to work in Ireland a non-EEA National, unless they are exempted, must hold a valid Employment Permit. The Department of Enterprise, Trade and Employment administers the Employment Permits system. Detailed information on work permits, Highly Skilled Eligible Occupations List, etc. is available on:

<u>Coming to work for more than 90 days - Immigration Service Delivery (irishimmigration.ie)</u>

Ineligible List of Occupations - DETE (enterprise.gov.ie)

Childcare workers and the vast majority of hospitality jobs (with an exception of experienced chefs) are at present <u>not eligible</u> for work permits in Ireland.







Are you a Non-EU national?

Critical Skill work permit: If you have any of the critical skills listed on the <u>eligible</u> <u>occupations list</u>, you or your Irish employer can apply for a critical skills work permit e.g.

- Construction sector professionals: Architects, Town Planners and Surveyors,
 Engineering Professionals, including Civil Engineers, Structural Engineers and Site Engineers, Mechanical engineers, Electrical engineers, Quality control and planning engineers, email: constructionjobs@welfare.ie
- Nursing and Midwifery Professionals (Registered Nurses and Midwives), email: nurserecruitment@welfare.ie











Ireland

- Ireland has the youngest population in the EU (33% under aged 25).
